1. Courses in this catalog are open to currently enrolled high school students.
2. **Registration forms for high school will not be accepted without counselor's signature.**
3. All courses depend upon sufficient enrollment. Students should register promptly with their counselors since space is limited. Students who have not pre-registered may be accepted after the May 13th deadline subject to availability.
4. Courses, teachers and room assignments will **be confirmed by mail** prior to the start of summer school.
5. Credit will be awarded to students who pass the course and who have **no more than 2 days absence**. Each class is equal to **5 units of credit**. **No new credit will be awarded for classes previously passed**. Report cards will be mailed after the summer session.
6. **Enrollment priority will be given to students enrolled in the Pleasanton Unified School District. Out-of-district student applications must include proof of immunization along with a request signed by a counselor specifying needed coursework.**

**Attendance: Class Hours:** Period 1 is from 7:50 a.m. to 10:20 a.m. Period 2 is from 10:35 a.m. to 1:05 p.m. District policy is that in order to earn credit, students may accumulate no more than two (2) absences during summer school. A tardy is arriving after the start of class up to 10 minutes late. Three tardies are considered an absence. If the student arrives after the first ten minutes they may attend class to complete the academic work for that day. When a student accumulates a third absence, s/he will be dropped from summer school. **There are no excused absences, including medical.**

**School regulations:** All rules and regulations of the regular school year apply to summer school. Disruptive behavior and other behaviors that do not follow school and classroom rules are not permitted. Students not following school and class rules will be sent to the office. This will be recorded as an absence. A student who violates Education Code 48900 (i.e. fighting, drugs, smoking, etc.) will be suspended and dropped from summer school. Students dropped from summer school will receive no grades or credits.

**Student dress code:** The Board of Trustees believes that appropriate student dress is necessary to maintain order, provide a safe and productive learning environment and promote discipline. Dress that draws undue attention to or detracts from the educational process is unacceptable. Shoes must be worn at all times. Hats, bare midriffs and inappropriate shorts are not allowed.

**No visitors are allowed on campus.**

### Classes for students entering 9<sup>th</sup> grade only - courses are for elective credit.

**Course #697500:** Algebra Review – **5 elective credits** - Main concepts covered include the language and tools of algebra.

**Course #653805:** English Review – **5 elective credits** – Review and practice a variety of language arts skills.

**Course #655110:** Spanish 1 Review – **5 elective credits**. Only for those who have successfully completed two years of Spanish at the middle school and need to improve skills in order to move to the next level.

**Course #779585:** Volunteer Community Awareness: Students may earn up to 5 elective credits (1 for each 12 hours) by volunteering service during the summer session at a non-profit civic organization, selected by the student and approved by summer school administration. An informational meeting will be held Wednesday, June 29, at 1:30 p.m. in the Amador Valley High School Library. This class is available to all grade levels.

### **Senior Make-up**

(Grade 12, Maximum of 10 credits)

### **Course #779560 Current Seniors, class of 2011**

This class is for non-graduating seniors (class of 2011 only). Course work will be assigned as needed to complete graduation requirements. A graduation ceremony will be held July 28 at 3:00 p.m. Location to be determined. The home school will grant diplomas after the office opens in August.

### **Ac Support Math/CAHSEE**

California High School Exit Exam  
Grades 10-12, 5 elective credits

### **Course #697470.**

A course for students who have not passed the math portion of the CAHSEE. This course may be used to prepare for the CAHSEE.

### **Ac Support English/CAHSEE**

California High School Exit Exam  
Grades 10-12, 5 elective credits

### **Course #653100.**

A course for students who have not passed the English portion of the CAHSEE. This course may be used to prepare for the CAHSEE.

**Make-up Courses Grades 10-12:** In the following section, a student must have been enrolled in the class during a previous school year and have received a "D" or "F" grade. If your student registers for summer school in anticipation of receiving a low grade this semester, but ends up earning a grade of C- or higher in the class they requested, please contact the summer school office prior to the start of summer school to drop the course. A grade of C- or higher cannot be replaced in the grade point average. Students can take up to two semester long classes plus the volunteer community awareness class. If a student needs to make up a year of a course, s/he can request both periods of the same class. See your counselor with any questions and to turn in your form for counselor approval. College prep classes are indicated with a (P).

### **Math I (P)**

Grades 10-12, 5 math credits

**Course #697170.** This course covers introductory algebra concepts and skills using concrete rather than abstract approach.

### **Math II (P)**

Grades 10-12, 5 math credits

**Course #697175.** This course continues coverage of geometric and algebraic concepts and skills using a concrete rather than an abstract approach.

**Volunteer Community Awareness**

Grades 10-12, up to 5 elective credits

**Course #697180.** This course covers logic, proof, similar congruent triangles, modeling problems and applying functions and methods of proof.

**Course #697070.** This course is a formal development of the algebraic skills and concepts necessary for students who will take geometry or other advanced college preparatory courses.

**Course #697080.** This course further explores and expands upon algebraic concepts and skills.

**Course #697100.** This course is a formal development of the geometric skills and concepts for students who will take intermediate algebra.

**Course #653635.** Within the study of literature, emphasis will be placed on speaking, writing, grammar and vocabulary development.

**Course #653655.** (See above)

**Course #653795.** (See above)

**Course #665100.** This class is designed for students who have completed first year Spanish or two years of middle school Spanish but need to improve skills in order to move to the next level.

**Course #665120.** This class is for the student who has completed two years at the high school level and needs to improve skills to move on.

**Course #748330.** Emphasis of the course is placed on geography, unsolved problems of the modern world and the rise of democratic ideals.

**Course #748450.** Contents of this course include the French Revolution, World War I and II, Nazi Germany, Napoleon era and Stalinist Russia.

**Course #748180.** This course is to meet the state and district U.S. History requirements for graduation.

**Course #728021.** In this course students will study all aspects of health. Focus will be on the role students play in maintaining their own health.

**Course #737401.** This course does not fulfill the UC lab science requirement. This course will cover chemistry, physics and earth science.

**Course #737560.** This course does not fulfill the UC lab science requirement. This course deals with the origin of living things.

**Course #737500.** This course will be an overview of the life sciences as well as the biosphere as a whole; while also covering critical biological issues.

**Course #737660.** This course will tie basic chemistry principles to contemporary and technological issues. Students will learn about the interdisciplinary and thematic nature of chemistry.

**Course #712223.** This course is designed to provide large group instruction in sports and some individual exercises. Students may take the Fitness Gram test at the end of the session (individual sections allowed) if they have not already passed this test.
